# Haslett Heating & Cooling celebrates 100 years in business

If your kids question whether the part-time jobs they hold as students could ever amount to anything, have them call Haslett Heating & Cooling.

In the BX member's 100-year history, three of its five leaders started working there while students and went on to own the business.

In 1909, the company was launched as a roofing and sheet metal enterprise by Harvey S. Haslett, "tinner," and his brother, James, "riveter," according to the Columbus Polk's directory from that time. James left soon after the company started, and Harvey's first listed business address in 1913 was 863 Mount Vernon Ave.

"Harvey moved to manufacturing furnaces early on," said Stew McHarg, the company's past president. "We've found H.S. Haslett furnaces in houses around Columbus that date back as early as 1919."

Haslett's business evolved into a residential furnace installation and service company. In 1937, he hired a young clerk named Arthur Haire — who happened on the rare employment opportunity because he sat next to Haslett's daughter, Mary Lou, in high school.

Except for stints in the Navy and college, Haire never left Haslett, McHarg said. "In the 1950s, he began the process of buying the company from Harvey, and officially became president in 1962."

It was in the 1960s that Haslett Heating and Cooling hired another student employee who would become president: McHarg, who said landing his job was also by chance.

"I was dating a girl while an Ohio State student and we met in Columbus to visit the state fair," he said. "At the end of the day, I dropped her off at her uncle's house, who invited me in. Her uncle was Art Haire, and by luck, his college part-time help had just graduated."

Haire told McHarg to stop by Haslett the next morning to talk about a job, and McHarg was so excited that he spent the night in his car in the Haslett parking lot.

"When Art pulled in the parking lot, I jumped out of the car; I guess he realized I was really interested in the job," McHarg said. He worked for Haslett for the rest of his college years, and was a strong voice urging Haire to expand into commercial work.

"We never talked about me staying on with the company," McHarg recalled, "so right before graduation in 1970, I went in

to say goodbye to Art. He acted surprised and asked why I was leaving."

When the business graduate told him companies were offering "a lot of money," McHarg said, "Art told me he'd give me 10 percent more than my highest offer — without knowing what that was!"

McHarg stayed to manage the growing commercial side of Haslett. Early projects included Lawson's stores, Wendy's and Max & Erma's restaurants and "lots of downtown rehab jobs."

McHarg followed a formula that started with his two predecessors and continues today: building long-term connections with repeat customers. And as Haslett had done, Haire gave McHarg the chance to buy the business. By the time

McHarg became president in 1980, he had hired another student employee who would rise in the company: nephew Bruce Ames.

Haslett Heating & Cooling was purchased in 1999 by Blue Dot Services, Inc., and Ames assumed the title of location president. Four years later, Haslett became a local entity again, with Ames and Jeff Florer as co-owners. McHarg stays involved — "I call myself a semi-retired consultant," he said.

Florer holds the position of president today, attributing the company's success to its steady, solid relationships both internally and outside with its customers. "With the people we've got, and the quality work they do, people keep calling us back," he said.

Recently retired installer Paul Pigg embodies the Haslett philosophy. He spent 50 years with the company, starting in 1959. "I loved what I did," he said, adding, "and the reason I stayed was the way I was treated."
