## St. Patrick and mediation

What do St. Patrick and mediation have in common? If you missed the opportunity to learn all you need to know regarding the new act, here's an opportunity to get up to speed on St. Paddy's Day, March 17, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m.

Implementation of the Uniform Mediation Act after Oct. 29, 2005 subjected the mediation process to new regulations. Do you know how the UMA changed Ohio law on privilege? What is privileged under the UMA and more important what is not? Who can assert a mediation privilege and to what extent? Which of your client's communications are protected? Under the UMA when is it that mediation communications begin? Hint: It's earlier than you think.

Sponsored by the Alternative Dispute Resolution committee, the 3.0 hour video replay of the December 2005 seminar "Uniform Mediation Act" featuring Harold D. Paddock, Maria L. Mone of the Ohio Commission on Dispute Resolution/Conflict Management and Shirley A. Cochran, answers these and

other questions about the new regulations and how this impacts the mediation process.

Find out what UMA is and why and how it was created; the basics of UMA including the scope of the UMA (R. C. 2710.01 and .02); UMA privilege, including what is it, who has it, how broad is it and when it is waived (R. C. 2710.03); and exceptions to the privilege, including what things are never privileged (R. C. 2710.05).

Additional provisions, including limited reporting, confidentiality, mediator duties, the role of non-parties and electronic communications, will be covered as well. Practical considerations including managing privilege v. confidentiality, judicial settlement conferences, when to get it in writing and who tells what to the judge will all be discussed.

## How often should I communicate with my clients?

Let's take one of the most common questions I hear: "How often should I communicate with my clients?" Every client's expectations are different. Some clients are higher maintenance than others and require more hand-holding, while others say, "don't call me, I'll call you." Sometimes you may think that your clients believe they are the only client you have and that you are working on their case exclusively, 24/7.

One of the first things you need to do is to clarify what their expectations are. You check expectations by asking them such questions as how often they would like to hear from you and by what means: in-person, telephone, email or letter. The best time to determine communication preferences is when you first start working with a client. But you can still do it even with long term clients. Just let them know that you want to improve how you serve them and would like to make sure your communication patterns meet their needs.

Clients want to know that

you care about them. Let's say you are working on a matter for a client, and it's at an impasse - nothing is happening at the moment because you have no control over it; perhaps a document is in the courthouse waiting to be reviewed by a judge.

Remember, from a client's viewpoint, it may be a very important issue, and they are thinking about it a lot. From your viewpoint, you have put it out of your mind and are busy working on other client matters that have deadlines. To show your client you care, and are thinking about them, telephone

them and let them know what the situation is, "the document is currently in the hands of a judge for review, and when it makes it past that hurdle the next steps will be..."

That thirty-second unexpected phone call will go a long way in easing their mind and putting you in a good light. This is an excellent way to solidify client relationships. This is a non-billable thirty-second phone call that will make you look like a hero to your client. Try it today!

## Gen-Xers want flexibility most of all

Jason Walker has a "really cool job" at Microsoft: he can choose to go skiing in the morning and finish his work later at home. A job, he says, is only as good as the life it provides. Recent surveys show that's a sentiment most Gen-X employees share, viewing work as secondary to their lives outside the office. And they're more inclined than boomers to leave a job if their needs aren't met.

Sharon Jordan-Evans, co-author of "Love 'Em or Lose 'Em: Getting Good People to Stay," says over the past nine years she has polled 17,000 job holders asking, among other things, what would make them decide to stay with their company. Everyone under age 41 listed flexibility in their top ten. Unlike boomers, she says, they will forego a promotion to hold on to balance.

Authors Charlotte and Laura Shelton ("The Next Revolution: What Gen-X Women Want at Work") agree. They surveyed 1,200 Gen-Xers and report that they want work to be "only one component of a balanced portfolio." Experts are saying managers had better pay attention to this generational shift if they don't want to incur expensive turnover. Says Jason Walker, "It's hard to put a dollar figure on the autonomy I have, and the flexibility. Those are huge, huge keys to keeping me happy."

## More companies allow part-time

A study of part-time work finds it increasing at a slow steady pace, seen less as a work-life perk and more as smart business. So said 60 percent of those interviewed by researchers Ellen Ernst Kossek, Mary Dean Lee and others, who talked to 88 managers and executives in twenty U.S. and Canadian companies.

Their study found the prevalence of reduced-load work had increased in 60 percent of the

companies, with 70 percent saying their culture was more accepting of the arrangement. In a third of the firms, a change in CEO made the difference. The study concludes that having top executives who are committed to employees having a life can make a huge difference.

Some strategies that made reduced-load work pay off for all stakeholders: hiring high performers who can be trusted to

self-manage; paying careful attention to workloads when designing reduced-load positions; and communicating frequently, planning ahead and continuously fine-tuning.
